

Innovative Teaching Practices in My Classroom

1) Connecting with Real-Life Incidents

Contents are often linked to current events, social issues, or local surroundings to make learning more relevant and engaging.

Example: “A Thing of Beauty” – Poem from 12th Grade

We began by asking: “What is a beautiful flower we come across in our daily life?” Most students answered: “Rose.” We then discussed how we appreciate the rose, but often forget to value the thorns, leaves, and the entire plant.

This led to a deeper question: “If beauty is judged only by our eyes, what about visually challenged people?”

2) Creative Expression Through Skits

Students are motivated to participate in skits to explore and understand literary texts more deeply.

Example: “The Selfish Giant” – 8th Grade

In the final scene of the story, a little boy is struggling to climb a tree.

*The smallest boy in the class acted as the little child.

*The tallest boy in the class played the role of the tree.

*Another student acted as the Giant.

As the boy struggled, the Giant’s heart melted. He came down and helped the child climb the tree.

The students not only enjoyed performing but also understood the theme of kindness and transformation in a powerful, memorable way.
